

SEWING FOR HOPE CONTINUES TO FLOURISH

As Sewing for Hope begins its 6th year of existence, it is becoming increasingly clear that this project is about more than just providing dresses for the orphan girls of Tumaini Fund!

Mostly through word-of-mouth, news of Sewing for Hope has become an attractive community service teaching tool for several groups of children and young adults.

A private school in Ohio was introduced to our organization and chose Sewing for Hope to be the recipient of their annual "Do Small Things with Great Love" Lenten Collection. With their generous donation of over \$1,800 we were able to buy fabric to make many, many dresses for the orphans of Kagera.

The great group of the Lee County 4H Trail Blazers Club invited Sewing for Hope to join them for their "Hope for Africa" National Day of Service event in January 2015. It was a great day of educating the young adults about the difficulties the children of Tanzania face on a daily basis. In addition, the group cut out dress patterns, sewed the dresses and gave Sewing for Hope a nice donation to assist in our expenses of materials and shipping.

Fund. These donations have helped the Fund make progress towards its goal of raising \$325,000 in 2015; and we still have six months to go! 55 donations totaling \$157,000 were for specific purposes including:

- Mosquito nets
- Solar lamps
- 57 Bicycles
- Digging of 2 shallow water wells
- Renovation of 12 houses
- An irrigation project
- Distributions to the AIDS orphans: two sets of clothes, a school uniform, pens and pencils and a mosquito net

The remaining 231 donations totaling \$80,000 went to the General Support Fund that is primarily used to pay school fees for the orphans.

Since its inception towards the end of 2009, Tumaini Fund USA has raised \$880,000 and remitted \$826,000 to Tanzania. Funds remitted represent 94% of funds raised, indicating the Fund operates with a cost/income ratio
